Dear Members & Friends,

Every season at Grounds For Sculpture is a new opportunity for reflection, contemplation, and for fresh inspiration.

I am starting out this fall remembering Brian Carey, GFS's long-time landscape designer and architect who passed away last September. This September, we are gathering to remember Brian and celebrate his life and his indelible contributions to GFS. Brian was responsible for the design of virtually all the buildings and landscapes here at GFS. From the Red Maple Allee, to the Wisteria Arch, to the "Rabbit Building" turned Museum Building, Brian's vision and creativity are evident at every turn. To honor Brian's enduring legacy, we have established an endowment in his name to support the ongoing care of our landscape, gardens, arboretum, and horticulture collection.

I continue to be inspired by this year's indoor exhibitions, Local Voices: Memories, Stories, and Portraits and Spiral Q: The Parade. These artist-led and community-driven exhibitions are an opportunity for us to get to know our audiences better. Since opening in April, the response has been extraordinarily positive. I have heard from many of you directly as well as spoken to visitors on the grounds who say that the stories shared in both exhibitions are universal and make you feel connected to one another. As a leading museum, it is our duty to stay relevant. One of the ways we do this is by presenting art that inspires a dialogue with our community, and that welcomes new audiences as well. The exhibitions are really a springboard for long-term, meaningful engagement with our community. For instance, in partnership with Spiral Q and Artworks Trenton, we held our first ever community Procession in August called - Breaking Boundaries: Grounds For Gathering. After building puppets and creating colorful banners and flags with our Trenton neighbors — many of whom were kids from the Artworks Trenton summer camps – people gathered at Grounds For Sculpture to celebrate with a lively parade amongst the grounds, concluding with plenty of festivities and performances. You can read a lovely write up about the event here.

In case you haven't visited recently, I encourage you to check out our newest outdoor installation that is in progress, *Cloud Swing*, an interactive sculpture that accommodates people of all abilities. It features three standard swings and two wheelchair accessible swings that hang from a cloud-shaped metal canopy. Bringing *Cloud Swing* to GFS was a process many months in the making. The work was designed by Isometric Studio, and the fabrication and installation of *Cloud* Swing was funded by Wellcome Trust as part of their multi-year Mindscapes mental health program. Many of you also helped to support *Cloud Swing* as a part of our Access Campaign in June. Our goal with Cloud Swing is to promote accessibility, community, and playfulness — all core to our joyful work at GFS. You'll see this work along the main loop, by the pond on the way to the entrance of Rat's. It should be ready for use by mid-Fall, and I encourage you to delight in a few moments of unbridled fun.

Thank you, as always, for believing in GFS and for choosing to be part of our world.


### Virtual tour available of new exhibitions

While there is no substitute for visiting Grounds For Sculpture in person and taking the experience in through all your senses, a large selection of exhibition content is also available digitally through a virtual tour of the Domestic Arts building's two exhibitions, Local Voices: Memories, Stories, and Portraits, and Spiral Q: The Parade. Visitors to these Exhibition pages on the GFS website (groundsforsculpture.org/exhibitions/spiral-q-the-parade and groundsforsculpture.org/exhibitions/local-voices-memories-stories-andportraits) will find a portal to a virtual tour, which allows remote visitors to wander through the galleries via computer, tablet, or smartphone. The virtual tour includes highlights with additional information available by clicking or touching the green "i" icons, including images of the works, audio from individuals associated with that piece or event, videos of storytellers sharing their unique life experiences, and links for more information.

The use of this platform is supported by the Brooke Barrie Art Fund, which was launched in 2016 in memory of GFS' inaugural Director and Curator. Barrie is described as having a passion for nurturing artists and promoting their work—often championing and commissioning the creation of new works that would become part of the collection. Her legacy continues through

sound, and projection mapping to highlight a sculpture created by Klip Collective for this exhibition, which was fabricated at The Seward Johnson Atelier. Our current exhibition, Spiral Q: The Parade, was created as an opportunity for us to work with the Trenton community, and creating a public procession is a powerful way to build relationships! Grounds For Sculpture (GFS) in partnership with Artworks Trenton, invited Spiral Q to lead us in their practice of creating public processions from the ideas, memories, and creativity of the community. We started in December 2023 as the three organizations engaged the city of Trenton through outreach and later, during the summer, art making at multiple block parties. I worked alongside Trenton Artworks Director Craig Shofed and Education Director Nasir Square with Spiral Q staff, lead by Co-Directors Liza Goodell and Jennifer Turnbull, who set the framework for engagement. We brought questions for the public to respond to: the questions included, what do you want to protect, remember, and celebrate within Trenton? The answers to these questions were reflected in the banners & artwork made by the participants and highlighted the Trenton Bridge, food, family and lifting the next generation of residents. Throughout all the artmaking the invitation was for the local community to be welcomed into GFS and on a humid August day we welcomed over 250 quests to the grounds for a celebration with music, dance and art. Attendees gathered in the East Gallery and, after facepainting and adhering sparkles to our faces, visitors gathered posters, puppets and banners to move across the grounds in celebration of Trenton. The afternoon featured performers including the West Powelton Steppers and Drum Squad, the Watson-Johnson Dance Theatre, Charlie Thomas on Percussion and Pastor Tone showcasing a boxing demonstration with a student. This procession brought GFS closer to the community it hopes to serve while also raising awareness on the need for deeper, consistent, relationship building with our neighbors.







### 4th Grade Hamilton School Visits

This spring GFS was pleased to welcome 314 4th grade students from the Hamilton School District's Kuser Elementary School, Klockner Elementary School, Kisthardt Elementary School, Wilson Elementary School, Greenwood Elementary School, and Yardville Heights Elementary School.

Classes and their chaperones visited and explored the exhibitions and sculptures at GFS. As a part of their visit, teachers were provided with activities from the GFS Educational Toolbox related to the art that connect and engage students as they explore the world around us through deeper conversations, observations, and reflections. These are all skills that they can apply in any subject area of the curriculum.

### **Education Gallery 2023 Exhibitions**

This past year the Education Gallery showcased three exhibitions highlighting our work with community partners and revealing more of Spiral Q's community engagement process. These exhibitions were curated by the various artists involved in the exhibition along with support from the Education and Curatorial teams.



The artists of the Arc Mercer, in partnership with the Education team and volunteers at Grounds For Sculpture, welcomed the public to explore artists' interpretations of building and activating our places of living. The work in this exhibition was created over a year-long period of onsite artmaking and community building at Grounds For Sculpture. Through a process of collaborative brainstorming, materials exploration, and several artmaking sessions, the theme of familiarity with the world around us emerged. HOME explored and reimagined everyday people, places, and things in a joyful and vibrant way.

The Arc Mercer is a non-profit agency devoted to supporting individuals with developmental and intellectual disabilities in Mercer County. In addition to vocational training, Arc Mercer offers various artistic programs, such as music, drama and visual art, which allow participants to express themselves creatively. The Arc knows the beauty of art is that it enables individuals to find their own voice and show the world who they truly are. Learn more at arcmercer.org

This past spring GSF visited the Millhill Child and Family Development center classes to provide art programming that benefited students, teachers, and families. Students developed an ownership of their art and were proud of what they created by sharing it with their teachers, parents, and other visitors to the classroom. The experiences provided and encouraged the development of physical motor

skills, language, and self-expression. Storytelling was used as a vehicle to allow students to imagine as well as build vocabulary by introducing new words and ideas. Through our partnership with the Millhill Child & Family Development preschool classes we have created something beautiful. What childhood book inspired you? What was your favorite part of preschool? What art project did you enjoy the most when you were young?

The community partnership with the local classes is being used as a model for future school related community programming at GFS. Being able to create a framework for working with young children outside of GFS in the community is a valuable tool as we expand our educational offerings to the local school community.

Spiral Q's SparQ in Schools features Spiral Q's ninth annual partnership with Blankenburg Elementary School and the art carried in the school's 7th parade. In 2020 and 2021, the pandemic interrupted the parade, but in 2022 and 2023 Blankenburg students were back in action out in the streets of their school's neighborhood parading for the public, bringing students, staff, teachers, parents, and surrounding community out to celebrate their work.

Spiral Q's art education residencies use a sequential project-based engagement methodology to unleash the power of art to connect people, actions, values, neighborhoods, and movements to each other and to their collective creative force for change.

Teaching artists lead participants through a collaborative artmaking process that centers storytelling, transforming life experiences shared in story circles into large-scale artwork to be presented to the public in celebratory parades. More of Spiral Q's work can be found in the exhibition Spiral Q: The Parade in the Domestic Arts Building along with an original song and music video produced in the 2021 academic year in lieu of the parade.

**Grounds For Sculpture hosted "Dancing With The Blind" in the East Gallery on April 28, 2023.** Krystle Allen (co-founder of Eyes Like Mine) is a member of the Access Advisory Council, co-led by the Director of Guest Services, Sam Hwang.

"Dancing With the Blind" is a performance art program organized by members and supporters of Eyes Like Mine (eyeslikemine.org). This 8-week program involves fitness and dance training, creativity, and an inclusive accessibility platform through descriptive choreography and movement. The program offers an opportunity for people with and without disabilities to express themselves without barriers for their sighted partner to be enlightened by the culture of blindness.

### Corporate Volunteering

Volunteers from NRG were instrumental in helping to preserve the health of our river birch collection near *Space of Stone* by Magdalena Abakanowicz. The volunteers used pruning saws to thin and prune out weak growth so that the birches can thrive. In addition, the volunteers removed invasive vines and enjoyed using the uprooter tool to remove invasive trees. Removal of such invasives eliminates competition for the birches that could otherwise lead to their decline. As result of their work, approximately twelve loads of debris were removed from the area. Volunteers assisted with the loading of the debris and its transportation to the compost dumpster.

Volunteers from Bloomberg have helped to beautify the Wisteria Pergola located near the Sculpture Court. Volunteers trimmed back growth, cleaned up debris, and helped remove invasive species. Bloomberg's help allowed us to keep the wisteria healthy and keep the path enjoyable and safe for visitors.

Cure Insurance Arena volunteers spent a day in the heat helping clean up the Lakeside area of the park. They removed and chopped dead bamboo to help stimulate healthy growth in the area. Volunteers had lots of fun utilizing the loppers to help cut down the bamboo into manageable chunks.

### New work on loan

Members who participated in the April 2023 Member Preview Day may recall an awkward presentation around a new work on loan, *Cloud Swing* which as it turned out, was not yet installed in time for the preview. GFS members are a gracious and understanding group, and as a reward, those attending the presentation got to learn more about the trials and tribulations of creating a new work from the ground up, one that not only is designed to sit within the landscape, but also directly engages people of all abilities to physically engage to activate the piece. Challenge accepted! Over the course of the spring and early summer, GFS continued to work on preparing the site and installing the work. Due to its size, once fabrication was completed and the swings were tested, the sculpture had to then be cut apart at the fabrication facility in Brooklyn for shipping and was then reassembled and rewelded on site by Oliver Construction Group.

*Cloud Swing* is designed to inspire a world in which public art and play invite and include people of all abilities. Three slat board swings and two wheelchair

### **New Acquisition**

Grounds For Sculpture recently acquired Roberto Lugo's monumental sculpture Put Yourself in the Picture which was commissioned for his 2022 GFS exhibition. Roberto Lugo: The Village Potter. This sculpture was fabricated through a partnership with The Seward Johnson Atelier (TSJA) and the Digital Atelier. The design was digitally sketched by Lugo then milled in foam, hard-coated, and painted. Though it is exhibited indoors as part of *The Village Potter* exhibition, it was designed for outdoor installation.

The sculpture references patterns and themes that occur throughout Lugo's works, including graffiti, references to blue and white Chinese porcelain, African kente cloth, and Lugo's series of black and orange vessels inspired by Greek kraters, focused on policing and mass incarceration. The central element in his ceramic work often includes a portrait of Black or Latino historical figures or cultural icons, however in this large-scale piece, Lugo leaves the central space open, creating a platform that allows visitors to interact within the center of the work and providing a moment for visitors to celebrate their individual uniqueness in a monumental way. This platform will also continue to be a site for programming and has been activated for live performances.

On August 26, 2022, GFS's Education team activated this sculpture with an inspiring evening of spoken word titled Verses of Perception, in celebration of the Roberto Lugo: The Village Potter exhibition with local performance artists Nikki Nalbone, Takara Alexander, and Leah James. This event showed the power and potential for the artists and the public to re-interpret public sculptures.

Acquiring this work expands the diversity of Grounds For Sculpture's collection and allows an opening for dialogs around contemporary and global issues, one of the primary goals of the Curatorial Plan adopted in 2021, which outlines a strategy for the next decade of collection and exhibition growth.

accessible swings hang from a cloud-shaped metal canopy. The swings face each other, fostering community and a sense of belonging. This sculpture was designed by Brooklyn based Isometric Studio, whose mission is to unite graphic design and architecture to create empowering visual identities and spatial experiences. Through their collaboration with leading cultural institutions and non-profits, they create opportunities and partnerships characterized by intellectual rigor, aesthetic sophistication, and memorable storytelling. The fabrication and installation of *Cloud Swing* is funded by Wellcome Trust as part of their multi-year *Mindscapes* mental health program.



We are deeply grateful to Roberto Lugo for his gift to us, as well as to the individuals in the GFS community who provided a portion of the acquisition funding, in particular our members Gil Kunz and Danielle Guindo. Gil's late wife and Danielle's mother, Camille Lombard, was a longtime volunteer at GFS. Camille was also a gifted educator, whose career was devoted to teaching elementary students in public schools in New York and New Jersey, and instructing future teachers at the university level. After retirement, her volunteer work as a tour guide and with the horticultural team at GFS provided her with peace and purpose, and she spent countless afternoons walking the Grounds with Gil, her children, and grandchildren. When Gil and Danielle learned about GFS's need to fund the remaining portion of the acquisition, they knew immediately that this was an opportunity that would have resonated with Camille. Roberto Lugo said, "Art [should] be accessible everywhere: in schools, on the streets, and everywhere in between...art builds empathy and an understanding of other humans that will lead us to see ourselves in one another and thus grow a family rather than a society. This is about how beautiful we are when we get to see all of us." Camille embraced a similar vision, incorporating an understanding and appreciation of all kinds of artwork in her classroom, in her home, when she traveled, and in her lasting influence on her children and grandchildren. By dedicating this piece of art in Camille's memory, GFS and Camille's family and friends honor her unique gift of inspiring others to embrace the beauty and art around them, in all its forms.

A thought came into mind: You've found happiness here, this place makes you feel good. Followed by, You should come here more often. . . . I want you to become a volunteer here!... I want you to be happy!

### **Garden Challenges**

At Grounds For Sculpture, our unique horticulture collection provides an ever-evolving landscape throughout the seasons. Every month brings new blooms, new colors, and new forms. However, the care of such a collection is not without its challenges. Here is a look at some of the current challenges that the Horticulture team is addressing:

**PESTS:** One of the pests that has posed a particular challenge during the previous three summers is the American Lotus Borer (Ostrinia penitalis). As the name suggests, this pest is native to North America and has been problematic for the Lotus Pond. In its adult form, the pest is a tan moth that lays eggs on the surface of the lotus leaves. In its larval form as a caterpillar, it feeds on the lotus leaves which results in damage to the leaf edges (see photo). The larvae bore into the stem of the leaf to pupate--they will also bore into flowers, buds, and seed heads--and emerge as a moth in their adult form through an exit hole. As the pest bores into the stem, it damages the transport tissues within, resulting in the wilting and collapse of the entire leaf. Boring damage is evident in misshapen flowers and seed heads as well. Given that the Lotus Pond is a major summer highlight for many of our members and guests, the Horticulture team does their best to manage this pest. As the Lotus Pond is an active and thriving ecosystem with various species such as fish, frogs, and turtles, chemical management is not an option. The Horticulture team takes a mechanical/cultural approach instead, which entails physically removing all the above-water plant parts with evidence of infestation. To do this, we put on waders, go into the pond, and cut out infested leaves. This physically intensive task is not 100% effective but does help limit the damage and results in a longer bloom time.

**DISEASES:** One of the major diseases we contend with is Rose Rosette Disease (RRD). RRD is caused by a virus (*Emaravirus sp.*), which is transmitted from plant to plant by a tiny mite (*Phyllocoptes fructiphilus*). Both the virus and the mite are believed to be native to North America. There is no cure for RRD and the mite that vectors the virus is difficult to control, as it can travel long distances via wind, as well as on tools, clothing, and plant debris. Most landscape roses are susceptible, and the virus can kill an infected plant in two to four seasons. You may have observed evidence of RRD disease yourself - symptoms include excessive thorniness, elongated shoots with unusual red

or yellow pigmentation, distorted leaf growth, and witches' brooms or rosettes (unusual cluster of shoots exhibiting the above symptoms; see photo). Chemical control of the mite is difficult, expensive, and has limited effectiveness. The management of the mite and virus poses a particular challenge for the Horticulture team, especially given the size and scope of our rose plantings. At GFS, we primarily use mechanical/cultural methods for addressing RRD and are experimenting with different rose cultivars. Recent research has identified several cultivars that may be resistant either the mite or the virus. This research is only in its infancy, but the GFS Horticulture team will be keeping a close eye on the results.

**CLIMATE CHANGE:** Perhaps one of our biggest ongoing challenges is the effects of climate change. According to the NJ Department of Environmental Protection, the last two springs in New Jersey have been some of the warmest on record and the summer of 2022 was the third warmest summer on record. Mercer County was also in a drought for much of summer 2022, which extended into the fall as well. The results of such increasing extremes have been felt throughout the garden. Our arborvitae (Thuja occidentalis) and cherry laurel (Prunus laurocerasus) have suffered as a result. You have may noticed the effects on these plants in your own neighborhood as well. The process of removal and replacement is no small undertaking, as these plants make up a substantial portion of our collection. As we move forward in this process, the Horticulture team continues to research alternative plants, including those with more heat tolerance.

### **Bloom Watch**

(September - December 2023)

The weather may be cooling down but some of our plants on the grounds are heating up! Here are some fall and early winter blooms not-to-be-missed.

### **SEPTEMBER**

Heptacodium miconioides (Seven-Son Flower) is a small tree that brings multi-season interest to the grounds. Our Heptacodium trees begin to bloom in late summer to early fall, with graceful panicles of fragrant white flowers throughout the canopy. These flowers serve as an excellent late-season food source for many pollinators. Heptacodium is the gift that keeps on giving — by late September, as the white petals fall away, the sepals remain, elongating and turning red, creating an even showier display. Come winter, be sure not to miss this tree's lovely exfoliating bark as well. Our two Heptacodium trees can be found along the bank of the Carmelita pond, towards the end nearest the Maple Allée.

#### **OCTOBER**

Tricyrtis hirta, commonly referred to as Toad Lily, is an herbaceous perennial that blooms in the shade. Be sure to take a close look at these small yet intriguing one-inch flowers. The star-shaped blossoms have an orchid-like quality to them and are lavender dotted with vibrant shades of purple; colors will vary by cultivar, however. Toad Lily flowers emerge all along the stem from within the leaf axils as well as in clusters at the end of each stem. You'll find this woodland beauty at the base of On Poppied Hill and along the stream bank near the Maple Allée.

### **NOVEMBER**

Osmanthus heterophyllus 'Gulftide' (False Holly) is a dense evergreen shrub commonly used as a hedging plant and can be found throughout the grounds. While dutifully serving its purpose as a hedge or screen, Osmanthus

also gives us the gift of incredible fragrance in late fall. As the weather begins to turn chilly, the dainty white flowers begin to open all along the stems. Though they are tiny, these blooms are powerfully fragrant and can perfume a surprisingly large area. Be sure to walk across the Van Gogh Pond bridge towards the Member Lounge while the False Holly hedges are in bloom to take in this magnificent aroma.

#### **DECEMBER**

Flowers in December? Yes, we have those at Grounds For Sculpture! The appropriately named *Camellia* x'Winter's Joy' puts on a spectacular show, often beginning in November and continuing into December. This particular *Camellia* hybrid has been bred for extra cold hardiness and always seems quite content in its home, tucked into a corner of the Water Garden. If you find yourself wishing for a little extra "winter joy" this season, be sure to take a stroll through the Water Garden for a delightful reminder that beauty can thrive even when least expected.
