GFS Joins Cultural Access Network



WELCOME

Dear Members.

I am excited for you to explore this issue of *Newscasting* and gain some behind the scenes insights into our work. It was a very busy summer for us at GFS, and the fall is going to be equally packed. One of the main focuses for me as leader of GFS was successfully assuming management and operations of the Johnson Atelier and its state-of-the-art modeling, scanning, milling, painting, and finishing capabilities. This union represents an innovative business model: a nonprofit sculpture park operating a revenue-generating sculpture fabrication business. GFS will expand our ability to produce work that can be exhibited on our own campus, and facilitate the production of work for venues around the world, allowing us to go beyond our gates and deliver on our mission to make sculpture and public art broadly accessible. A great example of this is our recent collaboration with Roberto Lugo. While he was in residence here in 2022, he created the monumental piece Put Yourself In the Picture that now is part of our permanent collection. Since that time, he has become a client of the Johnson Atelier, producing other large-scale works that are going out into communities and museums around the country. The possibilities ahead to collaborate and cultivate relationships over time with both blue-chip artists and emerging talent is incredibly exciting. Stay tuned for more updates, which will include artist residencies, new sculpture both on and offsite, and more.

Another exciting venture, both for GFS and for me personally, was the opportunity to curate an exhibition by Chicago-based interdisciplinary artist Salvador Jiménez-Flores. I had the privilege of meeting Salvador when he was part of our group show Fragile: Earth in 2022 with The Color Network. Once I saw his work and felt that there may be opportunities for more at GFS, we began a conversation to see how we might expand our collaboration. This new exhibition on view in the East Gallery and outdoors, titled Raíces & Resistencias, opens on September 28, and addresses critical issues of migration, cultural hybridity, and resilience. GFS has commissioned a bronze cast sculpture, which will be on view outdoors during the exhibition and will be a new addition to our permanent collection. During a time when art and artists are being silenced, GFS continues to be artist-led and responsive to the world we live in. Salvador's work tells a broader, more nuanced story about what it means to be from more than one place—and how artwork can help us understand each other better.

Thank you for being part of our community and making this kind of impactful work possible. It is encouraging to see how our 42-acre campus in Hamilton, NJ is guickly becoming part of a national (and international) arts landscape. We couldn't do that with your partnership.

As an organization, Grounds For Sculpture has made positive strides towards accessibility and accommodations. From June-December 2024, we participated in Art-Reach's Accessibility Task Force pilot program to audit our policies, practices, procedures, and programs to determine improvements for equitable engagement and access for people with disabilities. The result is a three-year Strategic Accessibility Plan that will advise us on our work going forward. Check this space for updates!

The Access Mobile Tour is a 45-minute tour that is available daily for visitors with disabilities or limited mobility. The cart can accommodate either a maximum of five people OR four people and a wheelchair. Tours are scheduled at 11AM, 12PM, 2PM, 3PM. You can reserve seats for the guest who needs it + one additional guest (additional guests may join the tour to the guides discretion). Danny Simmons presented Wordsmith: A Def Poetry Reunion Honoring Sonia Sanchez – The Poetry Of Peace & Resistance on Thursday, June 12. This partnership is inspired by our 2023 acquisition of Roberto Lugo's 20-foot vessel Put Yourself in the Picture which is installed outdoors in our 42-acre sculpture park. The piece is Lugo's largest work, to date, and was created at the Johnson Atelier as part of his 2022 exhibition at GFS. We were thrilled to partner with poet, painter, and philanthropist Danny Simmons as he curated Def Poetry Alumni to share their poetic practice utilizing the vessel as a performance piece. The evening included the opportunity to explore our art-filled gardens, indoor exhibitions – Slow Motion and Clifford Ward: I'll Make Me A World – and food trucks. Performers included Toni Blackman, Kraal "Kavo" Charles, Derick Cross, Lezlie Harrison, Vanessa Hidary, Roberto Lugo, Jessica Care Moore, Abiodun Oyewole, Bonafide Rojas, and Nioka Workman and the Firey Strings Company.

Before the performances, Tammi Lawson, curator of the art and artifact division at the New York Public Library's renowned Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture, hosted a powerful pre-event talk for members and the general audience between Danny Simmons and Abiodun Oyewole.

We were delighted to hear how much attendees enjoyed the evening of poetry, live music and food trucks in the gardens. It was an unparalleled experience that captured the joy and power of community. Many GFS members will recall Roberto Lugo's exhibition at GFS in 2022, Roberto Lugo: The Village Potter. GFS acquired Lugo's 20-foot vessel Put Yourself in the Picture in 2023, which is installed outdoors on our 42-acre campus. Roberto Lugo is an artist, ceramist, social activist, poet, educator, and friend of GFS! In celebration of Lugo's exhibition Roberto Lugo / Orange and **Black** on view in Princeton, GFS organized a Member Meet-Up at Art@Bainbridge on Tuesday, June 17. Lugo's exhibition featured "vases that draw on the shapes, techniques, and decorative motifs of ancient Greek vases in order to tell personal and communal stories of contemporary social and political oppression" ("Roberto Lugo / Orange and Black", Princeton University Art Museum). Associate Curator of Ancient Mediterranean Art (and the curator for this exhibit), Carolyn Laferrière, shared insight on how the exhibition came together and connections between Lugo's vases and a selection of ancient Greek vessels from the Princeton University Art Museum's collections that were presented alongside his work.

'Waste as Art: Excavating **Future Futures** Through Multiple Perspectives" + Member Mingle

The talk "Waste as Art: Excavating Future Futures Through Multiple Perspectives" featured a panel discussion with artist Billy Dufala alongside anthropologist Robin Nagle (NYU) and historian Paul Farber (Monument Lab), moderated also by Farber on Saturday, **June 28.** The panel explored how the work can be interpreted in diverse contexts—from museum spaces to landfills. Attendees were encouraged to think critically about waste transformation into art and to consider multiple frames of reference to understand our relationship with waste as a material.

Following the talk, a Member Mingle was offered to give members time to converse with the panelists and to socialize while enjoying a variety of refreshments — including a Cookie Station featuring talk-themed Dump Truck Cookies and Compost Krispies. SHHH in Conversation: Ana Teresa Fernández and Paul Farber

On Saturday, July 12, Grounds For Sculpture and Monument Lab hosted a virtual conversation between artist Ana Teresa Fernández and curator Paul Farber about language, loss, renewal, and **reimagining monuments.** The discussion centered around Fernández's powerful sculpture SHHH, featured in the Slow Motion exhibition, which uses mirrored gold acrylic discs to reflect themes of ecological fragility, cultural extinction, and climate justice. The conversation offered insight into the intersections of language, displacement, and environmental urgency, underscoring the importance of art as a catalyst for awareness and dialogue.

Grounds For Sculpture Joins The Cultural Access Network Project

The programs and services of the Cultural Access Network Project are guided by a volunteer steering committee representing arts patrons, state and county officials, arts administrators, and managers from organizations serving people with disabilities. GFS has been invited to sit on this steering committee.

The Cultural Access Network Project was established in 1992 to assist all of New Jersey's cultural arts organizations in making their programs and facilities accessible to seniors and individuals with disabilities to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The Cultural Access Network Project committee is comprised of individuals with specific knowledge and expertise in areas relating to accessible programming and facilities.



Recently, on May 28, GFS announced that our sculpture park, along with Johnson Atelier, are now officially operating as one institution, marrying their unique strengths to form a contemporary arts powerhouse with the distinct ability to produce, conserve, and exhibit large-scale, high-caliber sculptures, and create amplified art experiences that will benefit members like you.

GFS has assumed management and operations of Johnson Atelier and its state-of-the-art modeling, scanning, milling, painting and finishing capabilities, along with its assets including the Motor Exhibits Building, which currently houses studios for 25 artists.

Throughout his career, GFS and Johnson Atelier's founder, Seward Johnson, desired to make the impossible possible while working outside of the confines of traditional art systems and structures. Together, GFS and Johnson Atelier represent 50 years of artists creating together, changing how artists make sculpture, and reimagining how communities engage with the arts. This unification is the realization of Seward's vision, and his hope for these institutions to work as one.

What's more, this enterprising business structure of a nonprofit sculpture park operating a revenue generating sculpture fabrication business that produces work that can be exhibited on its campus, and in venues all over the world, allows GFS to go beyond its gates to deliver on its mission to make sculpture and public art broadly accessible. And, with artist studios right on our campus, we'll be able to both support local artists and develop programs to host guest artists-in-residence, furthering our ability to make art accessible to all.

Here at GFS and Johnson Atelier, we are excited for this union and what it promises for us and for you: a new era of artistic synergy, expanding impact, recognition, and artist support on a global scale, and our ability to provide enhanced cultural experiences for members like you.

The transfer of assets was made possible by The Seward Johnson Atelier (TSJA), which will continue to steward Seward Johnson's legacy through exhibitions, artwork loans, and the sale of Seward Johnson artworks, ensuring his sculptures remain accessible to audiences worldwide.

The Education Gallery at Grounds For Sculpture—located in the Seward Johnson Center for the Arts—is a dedicated indoor space for showcasing creative work developed through arts-education partnerships and more. Annually, the Education Gallery showcases an average of seven Community Partner and GFS exhibitions. Recently, these have included shows from ARC Mercer, Millhill Child & Family Development Preschool, Trenton Area Soup Kitchen and The Trenton Community A-Team (TASK/TCAT), GFS Staff, and GFS Members. As this partnership grows, so does its impact, creating a safe, welcoming space where all guests can feel celebrated and find moments of peace and comradery.

Hamilton Senior Center Wellness Visits

GFS has been delighted to partner with the Credit Union of NJ Foundation to support access to wellness classes for the Hamilton Senior Center. Beginning in 2023 for access to Wellness Walks, then in 2024 we welcomed seniors from the center to participate in Tai Chi classes. In 2025, we offered Chair Yoga classes. We hope to continue our relationship with the seniors that attend these classes and offer various types of yoga in the future, as participants have been incredibly dedicated to attending Wellness programming and exploring more of GFS. We have also welcomed two new volunteers from the program!

Teacher Summer Institute

In early August, GFS hosted its **Teacher Summer Institute**, a unique 3-day professional development series for educators onsite at GFS. The Institute was an immersive experience designed to empower educators with new tools, techniques, and inspiration to foster holistic learning in their classrooms. Each day's agenda was focused on a specific pillar of GFS's vision (art, horticulture, and wellness) and featured a variety of speakers and instructors. Participants engaged in hands-on workshops, interactive presentations, and guided tours that offered practical ideas ready for implementation with students. Thanks to generous support from the Dina Wind Art Foundation, we were able to offer a limited number of scholarships for educators who might not otherwise be able to attend. John Wind, President of the Foundation, and Bill Osman, Education Director of the foundation, were also onsite for one of the days to hold a session incorporating Wind's mother's piece, *The Harp of David #1*, on our campus.

Interns

This summer, the Education team welcomed two talented interns: Ingrid Alarcon, a recent graduate of New York University, served as our Public

Programs Intern (pictured on the left), and Christalee Kirby, a graduate student at Drexel University studying Arts Administration with a focus on Museum Leadership, joined as the School and Group Visits Intern (pictured on the right). Ingrid worked to make public programs more accessible, including developing an ASL tour of select works in the exhibition *Clifford Ward: I'll Make Me A World* in collaboration with artist Cliff Ward. She also created and led a family program centered on environmental themes. Christalee supported student and adult group visits, concluding her internship with a hands-on school workshop inspired by the animism themes in Cliff Ward's exhibition. Both interns brought a passion for museum education and were an asset to the team this summer.



In late June, GFS hosted the program "Native Plants of Lenapehoking: The Beauty Around Us" in partnership with Native Roots Farm Foundation (NRFF). NRFF is a Delaware-based nonprofit that reunites Native people with aspects of their heritage and shares this knowledge with the wider community through educational programs that use art, culture, and food to encourage connections with the natural world.

"Native Plants of Lenapehoking" included an hour-long walking tour of the grounds, co-led by GFS Manager of Horticulture, Cat Swiderski, GFS Horticulturist, Jen Mothes, and NRFF Executive Director, Courtney Streett. On the tour, participants learned about the ethnobotanical histories and wildlife associations of various native plants on the property before speaking aloud each plant's name in either Lenape, Munsee, or Passamaquoddy languages. Native communities, including the Nanticoke and Lenape tribes, have been leading language revitalization efforts since being intentionally separated from their languages or forced to speak English during colonization. NRFF contributes to these efforts through the sharing of plant names in their programs. Along the tour route, participants also had the opportunity to sample treats made from native plants including Tehim (strawberry) juice, prickly pear jellies, and white pine tea.

After the tour concluded, the group enjoyed an outdoor painting session where they used a selection of native plant dyes to create vibrant watercolor-

This was the second year of offering this program with NRFF. We would like to thank Leah Southerland, GFS Manager of Guest Services, for initiating this partnership, which is supported by the expertise of a cross-departmental team including Horticulture, Guest Services and Education.







Community Access Tickets Program
















Tasha Golden Social Prescribing Workshop

In partnership with the New Jersey State Arts Council, GFS hosted wellness expert Dr. Tasha Golden for a talk on the social prescription movement this spring, which is the practice of healthcare providers prescribing meaningful social activities – like visiting museums, wellness activities, volunteering, and more — to improve patient well-being. We welcomed 90 colleagues from across the state, representing other arts institutions, hospitals and local health care agencies, universities, as well as artists and art practitioners. Together we learned more about how we can work together to build coalitions around wellness.

Business Members have been holding small to large meetings onsite, utilizing our spaces for offsite retreats and regional meetings, attending a variety of team buildings (some returning with different departments after a great first experience!) and tours.

They also support access to GFS through the <u>Families First Discovery Pass</u> program. Residents who receive benefits through SNAP, WFNJ, Child Care Subsidy and/or WIC are eligible for up to 6 daytime general admission tickets per visit at GFS. Along with Barbara and Gerald Essig and M&T Charitable Foundation, Business Members have supported 695 tickets through this program for 2025.

Early Fall

Acer saccharum ssp. nigrum, commonly known as black maple, welcomes the season in with a spectacular show of autumnal color. Black maple is closely related to sugar maple and is native to central and eastern North America. The vibrant yellow and orange hues of this impressive specimen grace the Museum lawn throughout the month of October.

Taxodium distichum, commonly known as bald cypress, is a deciduous conifer that greets late fall with rich, rusty orange tones before dropping its needles. This tall, stately tree is native to southeastern North America and is often found in southern swamps but grows readily in drier soils as well. Bald cypress can be found planted throughout the grounds, but the most spectacular display of fall color will be in the Meadow as you meander down the path of the Taxodium Allée during the month of November.

Spotlight on the GFS Horticulture Interns

Did you know that GFS Horticulture has an internship program? Every year, the Horticulture department selects two to three interns from a pool of undergraduate applicants currently studying horticulture or a closely related field. Both GFS Horticulturist Jen Mothes and I both got our start at GFS through the internship program! Other past interns have gone on to successful careers in fields such as arboriculture and environmental engineering.



Our Horticulture interns work alongside staff throughout the season, cultivating important skills such as proper planting and establishment practices, tree and shrub pruning, plant identification, aquatic gardening, plant propagation, integrated pest management, and using and maintaining power tools such as chainsaws and hedgers.

Throughout this past summer, interns Sarah Light and Josie Buck worked with the Horticulture department full-time, learning the ins and outs of working in a public garden and how to navigate the unique challenges of maintaining the art-filled landscape that is GFS.

Sarah is a Conservation & Wildlife student at Delaware Valley University (pictured on the right propagating climbing hydrangea) and Josie moved to NJ for the summer to join us from Kansas State University, where she is a Landscape Horticulture student (pictured on the left mastering the backpack blower). Field trips are an important part of the Horticulture internship program — Josie and Sarah enjoyed visits to other public gardens such as Brooklyn Botanic Garden, Longwood Gardens, and the Scott Arboretum, where they attended the Woody Plant Conference with the rest of

Both Josie and Sarah especially enjoyed learning to use power tools and how to propagate both woody and herbaceous plants. We're grateful for the energy and perspective our interns bring each season and are always pleased to be a part of their growing career and future endeavors.

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On September 28, a new exhibition opens in the East Gallery. <u>Salvador Jiménez-Flores: Raíces & Resistencias</u> features work by artist Salvador Jiménez-Flores and curated by Grounds For Sculpture's Executive Director, Gary Garrido Schneider. While he is an artist who works in many different mediums, metal, glass and performance among them, Jiménez-Flores' art practice has a strong focus in ceramics, which he also teaches at the prestigious School of the Art Institute of Chicago.

The main focus of this exhibition is a wall mural on the 80-foot articulating wall, painted in clay slip. We tend to think of clay as a raw material that is formed and fired into three dimensional objects, decorative or functional.

Jiménez-Flores used clay slip, which is watered down clay in both terracotta and porcelain clays which he mixed with pigments to create some variation on the color palette for the mural.

The choice to paint with clay references natural-dyed murals that once adorned ceremonial Mesoamerican buildings (Mesoamerica is an historical region and cultural area that begins in the southern part of North America and extends to the Pacific coast of Central America).

"This mural traces a complex and intertwined history of colonization, labor, and migration in the Americas."

"It begins with the recognition that long before railroads were built or borders drawn, these lands were home to Indigenous nations whose histories were violently disrupted by conquest, forced displacement, and genocide. These acts of violence are not relics of the past, form the foundation of today's systems of power and exclusion. From colonial imposition to the modern machinery of global capitalism, this mural confronts how systemic extraction of land and labor has shaped the Americas."

He uses this mural to highlight the history of Mexican workers who helped build this nation laying railroads and harvesting crops during wartime and those who continue to support this country such as migrant laborers in agriculture, construction, hospitality, and healthcare industries.

"In today's volatile immigration climate—where policies shift between political spectacle and humanitarian crisis—this mural gains renewed urgency."

"It stands as a monument to the dignity of migrant lives and labor and as a critique of systems that profit from exclusion. It demands not only that we remember history, but that we act within it."

"It speaks to the ongoing legacies of colonization and capitalist expansion while affirming the cultural, political, and spiritual resistance that has always thrived beneath the surface—
raíces de resistencia."

Jiménez-Flores was born in Mexico and currently resides in Chicago. His family has a long history over multiple generations of crossing back and forth over the border between Mexico and the United States in search of opportunity. He points to his own struggles adjusting to living life in the US as a teenage immigrant as a formative event and he continues to explore themes related to immigration and living a "hybrid" identity.

Hybrid human/plant forms are a theme in Jiménez-Flores' work and are evident in the new sculpture displayed along the Main Loop. This hybrid human/cactus totem conveys themes of identity, cultural hybridity, resilience, and survival. Incorporating nopals or prickly pears into his work, leaves Jiménez-Flores to create a visual language that speaks to the strength and endurance of marginalized communities, while also envisioning a future where hybrid identities are celebrated rather than excluded. He offers a hopeful vision of what it means to resist, adapt, and thrive in the face of adversity.



Just outside the East Gallery is a sculpture on view in the hedge gardens. *Caminantes* is a hybrid human/plant form, with spiky, leaf-like "legs" and bare human feet, positioned on top of a steel pyramid base. The title of this sculpture translates to "wayfarers" in English. Jiménez-Flores created this work to celebrate the immigrant community that migrated to the US and setup roots. "We underestimate how courageous people are to leave behind everything they know for an uncertain dream."

Bloomberg Digital Accelerator Program

Grounds For Sculpture is proud to participate in Bloomberg Philanthropies' Digital Accelerator Program (DAP), which supports arts organizations through strategic improvements to technology infrastructure.

GFS launched the DAP project in July 2025 and with implementation continuing through the winter of 2026. It is led by Faith McClellan, GFS Director of Collections & Exhibitions, and Bloomberg Tech Fellow, alongside a cross-departmental project team that includes Claire Cossaboon, Director of Membership, Sam Hwang, Director of Guest Services, and Joshua Ortiz, Director of Brand. The project will focus on improvements to our website through four key areas: implementing a new art collection database which will speak directly to the online collection catalog, piloting the creation of new digital collection content, improving the online ticket purchase experience, and creation of a new GFS member space within the website.

Migrating to a new collections database was a key improvement identified by the Curatorial team for more operational efficiency and to better manage an ever-growing range of related digital documentation. Through an interface with the new database, collection content available on GFS website will now be updated in real time. Additionally, the focus on the art collection will include piloting the creation of new digital content, such as videos of less accessible areas or park and recorded ASL tours, which are goals of the organization's ADA plan, created in consultation with Art-Reach.

Conversations between GFS staff and vendors familiar with the areas of user experience and website design helped refine the project scope and prioritize impactful areas for investment in ticketing and membership. A large portion of this project will focus on revising the website's user interface to increase ticket sales and donations and launching a dedicated member experience on the website to deepen members' relationship with GFS.

Together, these enhancements expand GFS' capacity to meet the needs of our visitors through strategic technological investments which will deepen engagement and increase financial sustainability.

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Since 2021, Bloomberg Philanthropies has invested \$128 million in the Digital Accelerator Program to support nearly 350 cultural institutions in the U.S. and U.K. and has supported the development of best practices to share across this network of nonprofit cultural organizations. To date, the 40 institutions that were part of the first cohort cumulatively grew an additional \$20 million in new revenue, reached over one million new audience members, and engaged more than 4,000 new artists and partners.

Grounds For Sculpture is one of 200 nonprofit cultural organizations accepted into Bloomberg Philanthropies' latest Digital Accelerator Program cohort, spanning artistic disciplines and organization sizes across 52 U.S. cities
